New! Skill Level Guidelines

Are you sure you're playing on the correct court?

Hi Members!

As you know, at Tustin Pickleball, we have an "open play" format where players rotate in and out of games, often with people of mixed skill levels. While open play encourages inclusivity and social interaction, it also comes with potential issues.

As our membership continues to grow and more drop-in players mix in, playing on the wrong court is becoming an issue that impacts the quality of play. Having the best game possible usually requires that all players (or both teams) on the court are roughly the same level. If just one player on the court is at a very different level, advanced players may get bored or frustrated, and novice/intermediate players may feel intimidated, embarrassed or discouraged. Furthermore, a mismatched game could be over in an instant resulting in a waste of time for everyone when wait times are long.

Since our club does not use player ratings (e.g., DUPR), we often get asked "how do I know which court I should play on?" To answer this question, we have created a set of guidelines to assess your skills and help you determine where to go. These guidelines, which will become effective Monday, September 1, 2025, list observable skills that are needed to play on a particular level court.

To support this effort, we have created a team of "Court Monitors" consisting of Board members Terry Wong, Chiko Wong, Bonnie Goodman, Barbara Gerovac, Carl Cheng, Julie Cho, Jimmy Ogata and Members-at-Large Greg Goodman and JoAnn Spiegel. This team will use their discretion to redirect players as needed based on the skill level guidelines, overall wait times, and/or final scores of games.

* Please note that if you are not sure, or are unable to determine your skill level from the guidelines, feel free to reach out to one of our Court Monitors who can watch you play and help you determine which court to play on.

We also want to encourage peer moderation and ask everyone who is comfortable doing so, to politely speak up when someone stays too long on the wrong court. We could all use a simple innocuous statement such as "Hey, just a heads up...you might have better games and more fun on a different level court today". Confrontations can be avoided if we keep comments polite and respectful and if things aren't taken too personally if you are asked to move.

Unfortunately there is no perfect solution for this issue. In addition to skill set, game partner, strategy, tactics, competitiveness, athleticism, and age all contribute to a player's performance. However we believe that if all members make a concerted effort to ensure everyone plays on the right courts, we can maintain our high standard of play and create the best overall experience for everyone.
